

Past Simple v. Present Perfect Simple

Put the verbs in brackets into the *Past Simple* or the *Present Perfect Simple*.

Example:

He *left* (leave) home last year and I *haven't heard* (not hear) from him since.

6. We *have lived* (live) in this house since 1973.
7. She *has not stopped* (not stop) talking since she *arrived* (arrive).
8. It was raining when I *left* (leave) home.
9. We *were* (be) in Barcelona three years ago.
10. Anne *has just finished* (just/finish) a course in engineering.
11. I *have known* (know) her for ten years. She is an exceptional teacher.
